These interstates congregate around the City of Columbia, providing easy access in and out of the city with direct routes to Charlotte, NC and the Port of Charleston.




Columbia Metropolitan Alrport (CAE): 15 minute drive from the heart of Columbia, it features


Rail system served by Norfolk Southern and CSX.


