- (4) Wages for some occupations that do not generally work year-round full time are reported either as hourly wages or annual salaries depending on how they are typically paid. These wages are shown as an
- (5) Wages equal to or greater than \$100.00 per hour or \$208,000 per year are shown as a pound sign (#).
- (6) Estimates not released are shown as a double asterisk (\*\*).
- (7) Entry average wage is equal to 10th percentile wages; experienced average wage is equal to 90th percentile wages.
